

REPORT FROM KORR

On Thursday of 21st March I travelled to Loglogo knowing that I will catch up with the public vehicles heading to Korr but unfortunately on my way we had a puncture that delayed us for like 30 minutes. At around 4:50 pm we arrived at Loglogo. On arrival I found out that all vehicles to Korr were already gone so I had to spend and wait for them on the following day evening.

KORR

I arrived in Korr safely on Friday 22nd of March. On Saturday I met with brethren from TBC Korr and had a good time together. I was given an opportunity to prepare for a sermon for the following Lord's Day. On Sunday I preached from Romans 8:31-39. The Lord has been faithful all through. In the afternoon Ogom brought forth the Gospel to us.

Monday 25th March I had an opportunity to visit the nursery school at the church. I had good time with the kids and the teacher. The nursery is crawling in growth both spiritually and population wise. This is brought about by the lack of resources.

Tuesday 26th I visited Mr George Galale at the school where he heads. He was so excited to have me there and I distributed the Grace and Truth magazines to him and his fellow teacher together with some other material I had. This was an opportunity that he was looking for. Let's keep him in prayers as he is looking forward to get a church that preaches the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. Later in the evening, I went to Tirrim Secondary (Korr) to take the Gospel to them during their devotional time. This is a school sponsored by Africa Inland Church, and this is where I studied for four years. It was really exciting to be there.

Wednesday 27th Ogom and I planned to visit the schools in Lekuchula and Losidan.

LEKUCHULA

This is a primary school situated along Laisamis-Namareey road, around 4 kilometres from Namareey. Mr John Khalawkhale is the head teacher. It's a school that needs spiritual growth, since this kids have little knowledge about God. When they are asked to pray they would start doing those Catholic signs. So sad! There is a great need here. The school has some great needs besides having classes and teachers. These needs include the school resources of books, chalk, pens. Desks, uniforms for pupils, and one more teacher. Classes 1,2,3 especially need some exercise books and dusters. They lack foods in the school. They are doing well besides the mentioned needs. There needs more improvement from sponsors (Trinity Baptist Church). However, the head teacher really appreciates your effort as sponsors for successful registration of the school and wants frequent visits for spiritual guidance.

LOSIDAN

From Lekuchula we headed to Losidan. On the way our motorbike had a puncture that really delayed us so we had to spend a night at Laisamis so that we could make to Losidan on time. On Thursday 28th we departed from Laisamis at around 6 am. The road was so rough and sandy so we had to ride carefully and slowly. At around 9:45am we were at Losidan.

The school really struggles spiritually, since there no church around the place and also no one visits them for PPI (class for spiritual instruction weekly). Stephen Leseitalo visits them for spiritual guidance. The need here is so great. Let's trust the Lord to send people to the spiritually needy of this area.

Some request highlighted by the head teacher include:

- Salary increment for the teachers supported by Church.
- Provide food for the school since it's hard for students who come from far.

- Assist the school as per development:-
 - I. Repair of the kitchen and store.
 - II. Purchase of utensils, i.e. sufuria and plates.
 - III. Purchase of a place to store the books since books are all over the place.
 - IV. Spiritual guidance in the school.
 - V. Capacity building for Board Of Management.
 - VI. Help in provision of school uniform to the kids.
 - VII. Balls and nets.

The school has grown with the population of around 86 pupils (48 boys and 38 girls). It was a great pleasure to have some time of spiritual discussion with Martin and later Mzee Lepakiyo joined us. The need is great let's trust in the Lord for all this.
